From Micheaux to Morrison - Literary Adaptations to Film
A Movie Poster Exhibition presented by The Separate Cinema Archive

October 1 - November 1, 2008

Brown v. Board of Education National Historic Site, in conjunction with the Brown Foundation for Educational Equity, Excellence and Research, will host *From Micheaux to Morrison - Literary Adaptations to Film*, an exhibition of rare movie posters on loan from the Separate Cinema Archive. Based largely on the works of African-American authors, the exhibit offers insights into the portrayal and progress of blacks in American movies and culture and provides an historical examination of black screen images from silent and early films to the present day. Curated by Barbara Tapa Lupack, author of *Literary Adaptations in Black American Cinema: From Micheaux to Morrison*, it allows an opportunity to reflect upon and celebrate the rich tradition of American literature and its adaptation to the screen.
